

- lala.hū.** vs. Convex; swelling; increasing in size; erect, as male organ. **ho'o.lala.hū.** To cause to swell.
- lala.hua.** Pas/imp. of *lalahū*.
- lala'i.** Redup. of *la'i*. 'Auhea wale 'oe, ē ke ānuenuē e la-la'i maila i Hale-ola (chant), harken to me, O rainbow, so serene at Hale-ola.
- lā.lā.kanu.** n. A cutting (to plant).
- lā.lā.keā.** n. Whitetip shark (*Pterolamiops longimanus*), up to 4 m long. *Lit.*, white fins.
- Lala.ko'a.** 1. nvs. Rarotonga, Rarotongan. (Tahitian; the regular Hawaiian correspondent of Tahitian Raroto'a would have been Lalokona; the second *a* in Lala-ko'a probably assimilated to the preceding *a*; Gram. 2.9.4.) 2. (*Not cap.*) n. Prayer for *luakini* dedication. (For. 6:27.)
- lā.lā.ko'a.** vs. With strong limbs. *Lit.*, coral branch.
- lā.lā.kukui.** vs. Many. *Lālākukui akula ka manō o lalo* (For. 4:297), many sharks were below.
- lalala.** vi. To sun, bask; sunny. *He mau mo'o e lalala ana i ka lā*, several lizards basking in the sun.
- lala.lawe.** Similar to *lalawe*. (For. 6:523.)
- lā.lā.lū'au.** Same as *La'alū'au*. (Kep. 19.)
- lā.lama.** 1. vs. Daring, fearless, clever, as of a climber of precipices or trees. 2. nvt. To pilfer, meddle, grope, reach here and there; to be scattered here and there, as houses (Kel. 119); pilfering. *He keu ka lālama o ka lima*, how the hands pilfer.
- lalana.** n. 1. Spider. Also *lanalana*, *nananana*. 2. Warming, as at a fire. Cf. *lala*, warm. 3. (*Cap.*) Old term for London.
- lā.lani.** n. 1. Row, rank, file, line; verse of poetry. *Hele lālani*, to march in line. **ho'o.lā.lani.** To place in rows. 2. (*Cap.*) A name for the Milky Way (Kep. 81), and also of a single star. Cf. *Nā-lālani-a-pili-lua*.
- lā.lani.poe.poe.** n. Curve, arc.
- lala'o.** Redup. of *la'o* 1. *Lala'o ka 'ikena i ka manu* (song), see the bird all the time, as though in the eye.
- lala'ō. ho'o.lala'ō.** To insist on accompanying. *Ka'u po'e mo'opuna he ho'olala'ō i ka hele me a'u*, my grandchildren insist on going with me.
- lalapa.** Same as *lapalapa* 1, 2.
- lalau.** nvi. Mistake, blunder, going astray; to go astray, wander, blunder, err, gad about, have sexual affairs, miss the way. Cf. *maka lalau*. *Lalau ka no'ono'o*, to wander mentally. *Lalau wale*, to wander aimlessly. *Lalau ka 'ōlelo*, to talk nonsense or wander in talking. *He lalau!* Nonsense! 'O ia hele lalau wale iho nō e hele lalau ai! Just wandering aimlessly and to no purpose! *Ke lalau wale lā 'o Puna i Ka-lalau* (saying), Puna strays to The-stray [many puns illustrating a wandering mind refer to Ka-lalau, Kaua'i: see Pukui, Elbert, and Mookini]. **ho'o.lalau.** To cause to wander, lead astray; to procrastinate, dillydally, kill time; to digress or wander in speech, perhaps to avoid a subject; to deceive, as in actions to conceal what one is about; to divert, as a child from the matter he is crying about; roundabout.
- lā.lau.** vt. To seize, take hold of, grasp, reach out for, pick up, hold fast. **ho'o.lā.lau.** To cause to seize, etc.; to tackle. (PCP *la(a)lau*.)
- lā.lau.ahi.** vs. Gray, stormy-looking, smoke-colored. *Makehewa iā kāua ke hele, ke lālauahi maila 'o uka*, it would be a mistake for us to go, it's threateningly gray inland.
- lalau hewa.** vi. To wander in error, sin.
- lā.lau'ino.** vt. To snatch away or grab roughly or ruthlessly.
- lā.lau.lima.** vt. To grab in the hands, tackle, manhandle.
- lā.lā.wai.** vs. Prosperous, successful, well-to-do, rich.
- lalawe.** Redup. of *lawe*, to carry; thrilling, overwhelmed, transported with emotion; to itch. *Ka lalawe ninihi launa 'ole* (song) a quiet transport unsurpassing [love]. **ho'o.lalawe.** To produce thrills, itching.
- lale.** 1. vi. To hasten, hurry, push on; to encourage, urge on, stir up to action. See ex., 'eka 2. **ho'o.lale.** To hasten, incite, propose, provoke, hurry; to urge, suggest strongly, encourage. *Ua ho'olale mai 'oia ia'u e hele i Hilo*, he suggested that I go to Hilo. 2. n. Legendary bird mentioned in old tales and songs as a sweet singer.
- lā.lēa.** Buoy, beacon; prominent object or landmark ashore to steer by. (And.) Cf. *māka*, marker.
- lā.lēi.** nvs. Cluster, bunch, as of bananas; assembled together, as flowers in a lei. *Rare*. **ho'o.lā.lēi.** To gather together, as flowers.
- lale.lale.** Redup. of *lale*. **ho'o.lale.lale.** Redup. of *ho'o-lale*; to inspire, incite, rouse.
- lali.** vs. Greasy, as pork fat; slippery and shiny, glittering, sparkling, bright; sticky. Cf. *ali*, *hulali*. *Lali ka 'ili i ka hou*, skin sticky with perspiration. **ho'o.lali.** To cause greasiness, glitter. (PEP *lali*.)
- lā.li'i.** vs. Detailed; to do detailed work, attend to small details.
- lali.lali.** Redup. of *lali*. *Lalilali 'ole ka 'ili o ke akamai* (UL 36), the skin of the skilled [surfrider] is not slippery [with water]. (PEP *rarirari*.)
- lalo.** loc. n. 1. Down, downward, low, lower, under, beneath, below, subordinate; depth, lowness, west (see ex., *na'e* 1); hold of a ship (frequently preceded by prepositions, sometimes joined as single words). *I lalo*, *malalo*, below, underneath. *Kō lalo*, of or belonging to below or the south; the people from below; bottom. *Mai lalo*, from below. *No lalo*, from below, belonging to a lower or southern place. *O lalo*, from below, subordinate. *Kai lalo*, western sea, where the sun sets. *Lalo loa*, far down, below. *Lalo lilo*, very far below. (PPN *lalo*.) 2. Leeward, lee, southern.
- lalo.lalo.** vi. Of humble origin, lowly. (Malo 56.)
- lalo.loa.** n. A variety of sweet potato. (HP 142.)
- lalu, laru.** n. Name of a ravenous sea bird, perhaps a gull (RSV); cuckoo (KJV). (Kanl. 14.15.) (Gr. *laros*.)
- Lā Lū Pua.** n. Decoration Day. *Lit.*, day to scatter flowers. Cf. *Lā Kau Pua*.
- lama.** n. 1. All endemic kinds of ebony (*Diospyros*, synonym *Maba*), hardwood trees with small flowers and fruits. (Neal 674.) Also *elama*. (PNP *lama*.) 2. Torch, light, lamp. *Lama* wood was used in medicine and placed in hula altars because its name suggested enlightenment; huts were built of *lama* wood in a single day during daylight (*lama*) hours, and the sick were placed inside them for curing. (PPN *rama*.) 3. Also *rama*. Rum; any intoxicating drink. *Eng*. *He kanaka inu lama*, a person fond of drinking; a drinker or heavy drinker.
- lama ho'o.hui.hui 'ia.** n. Mixed alcoholic drink, cocktail, highball. *Lit.*, mixed rum.
- lā.maka.kanaka.** n. Holiday; festive day on which people gathered for parties and celebrations. *Lit.*, day of people's faces.
- lama.kēa.** n. A tree mentioned in a chant in Kam. 76:118.
- lama.kū.** n. 1. Large torch, formerly 60 to 90 cm tall, with the light coming from burning *kukui* nuts strung on a coconut midrib and wrapped in dried ti leaves and placed at the tips of bamboo handles; signal fires; lantern (Lunk. 7.16); sparks, as of a torch (Isa. 50.11). *Lamakū o ka na'auao*, torch of wisdom [said of great thinkers]. 2. Name for a medicine applied to sores.
- lama.kuhi.kuhi.** n. Beacon, signal light.
- lama.lama.** 1. nv. Torch fishing; torch; to go torch fishing. 2. vs. Fair-complexioned; bright-looking; animated; vivacious; to glow. *Lamalama ka 'ili*, to glow with health.
- lama.pa'i.pa'i 'ia.** Same as *lama ho'ohuihui 'ia*. *Lit.*, mixed rum.
- lamie, lamia.** n. Ramie, an introduced plant (*Boehmeria nivea*), related to the *māmaki*, and yielding a strong fiber used for rope, paper, cloth. (Neal 318.) *Eng*.
- lana.** 1. nvs. Floating, buoyant; moored, afloat, adrift; to drift, lie at anchor, as a fishing canoe (For. 4:295); calm, still, as water; anchor. Cf. *hālana*, *mana'olana*. *Huki ka lana* (Nak. 87), pull in the anchor. *Lana ke koko*, buoyant blood [of youth]; to circulate, of blood; high blood pressure (Kam. 64:43). *Lana ka mana'o*,
