

- ua.kea.** 1. n. Mist (famous at Hāna, Maui). *Lit.*, white rain. 2. vs. White as mist, mist-white, white as breaking surf or snow. *Moa uakea*, white chicken, as used in offering. *Ē Kāne uakea, eia ka 'ālana, he moa ualehu, he moa uakea, he moa 'ula hiwa* (Malo 180), O Kāne white as mist, here is the offering, an ashy-gray chicken, a mist-white chicken, a black-red chicken. *Na Kahiko ka nalu uakea i hānau* (chant), Kahiko gave birth to the mist-white waves.
- ua.ke'ē.** n. Bend, crook, as in a path.
- uaki, uati, uwaki, waki.** n. Watch, clock; a watch, as of a sailor. *Eng.* See *kū uaki*.
- uaki ho'āla.** n. Alarm clock.
- uaki pū.lima.** n. Wrist watch.
- ua.koko.** n. 1. A low-lying rainbow. *Lit.*, blood rain. See ex., *kt'ohu'ohu*. 2. A rain so heavy that it turns stream waters red-brown with the wash of the hillside. 3. Reflection of rainbow colors in the clouds.
- 'uala, 'uwala.** n. 1. The sweet potato (*Ipomoea batatas*), a perennial, wide-spreading vine, with heart-shaped, angled, or lobed leaves and pinkish-lavender flowers. The tuberous roots are a valuable food, and they vary greatly in many ways, as in color and shape. Though of South American origin, the plant has been a staple food since ancient times in many parts of Polynesia, as well as in some other regions. (HP 131-66, Neal 706-7.) (PEP *kumala*; cognates elsewhere in Polynesia may be borrowings from PEP.) 2. A variety of sugar cane, a yellow mutant of 'akoki with large stalks; often called *pilimai* and similar to it but stronger. (HP 221, 225.) 3. See *uhi 'uala*, a variety of yam (*Dioscorea alata*). 4. Large muscles of the upper arm, biceps, brachii. 5. A kind of cowry shell (no data).
- 'uala 'awa.'awa.** n. Sweet-potato beer.
- 'uala hē.Ŧ.** n. A variety of sweet potato.
- 'uala ho'o.mala.mala.** n. Mashed sweet potato, slightly fermented and eaten as poi.
- 'uala hū.pē.** n. Madeira vine (*Boussingaultia gracilis*). (Neal 344.) *Lit.*, mucus sweet potato.
- 'uala kahiki.** n. The white or Irish potato (*Solanum tuberosum*), a weak-stemmed herb about .9 m high, with lobed leaves. The white, starchy, underground tuber is a valuable food in many countries. A native of the Andes, it was introduced to Hawai'i in the early 1800s. (Neal 745.) *He Hawai'i 'uala kahiki*, an Irish-potato Hawaiian [one who apes white men instead of appreciating his own culture]. *Lit.*, foreign sweet potato.
- 'uala koali.** Same as *kūpala* 3, a wild sweet potato.
- 'uala.lehu.** n. A name later applied to yellow bamboo. (HP 222.)
- 'uala lehu.** 1. Same as *lahi*, a variety of sugar cane. (HP 222.) 2. n. A variety of sweet potato. (HP 225.)
- 'uala nika.** n. A variety of introduced sweet potato.
- ua lani.pili.** n. A heavy rain, as one lasting for days and days, or a cloudburst.
- 'uala pilau.** n. Turnip (*Brassica rapa*). *Lit.*, smelly potato.
- 'uala 'ula kī.na'u.** n. A variety of red sweet potato.
- ua.leha.** vs. Lazy. Cf. *palaleha*.
- ua.lehe.** 1. vs. Loose, loose-fitting, as a dress; sitting with the knees wide apart; stretching the mouth, as in a grimace. *hō.'ua.lehe*. Caus/sim. 2. vs. Wary of a hook, as a fish once caught and having escaped. *Rare*. 3. vt. To oust a tenant from his land and deprive him of the fruit of his work; to evict.
- Ua-lē.hei.** Short for *Ka-ua-lēhei-o-Makawao*.
- ua.lehu.** 1. vs. Gray, ashy-gray. See ex., *uakea* 2. 2. n. A variety of taro. 3. (*Cap.*) n. Wind name, Hālawā, Moloka'i.
- ua.lēi.** vt. To spread out, as a fish net.
- ua limua.** n. A period of constant rain. *Lit.*, moss-growing rain.
- ualo.** Var. spelling of *uwalo*.
- Ua-ma-ka-lau-koa.** n. Name of a rain at Nu'u-anu, O'ahu. *Lit.*, rain amid the *koa* tree leaves.
- ua meā.** See *mea* 6.
- ua.nana.huki.** n. Tapa beater. (Kam. 76:109.)
- ua (noun) nei.** See *ua* 2.
- ua.ne'i.** Short for *auane'i* 2, probably not, especially after words ending with *-a*. Cf. Oih. 5.39. *E mana'o ana he 'oia'i'o ka 'ōlelo a nā 'elemākule, 'a'ole kā uane'i* (FS 139), it was thought that the word of the old men was true, but it was not.
- uā.ni'i, uwāni'i.** nvs. Stiff, as salted fish; stiffness. See ex., *pēpē* 1., *uwa'uwali*. **ho'o.uā.ni'i.** To stiffen. *Ua ho'ouāni'i i kona kino me ka 'o'ole'a loa*, stiffened his body with all his might.
- ua noē.** n. Misty rain, fog.
- ua o.** Same as *ua ona o*, aforementioned. (Gram. 8.3.4.) *Mehameha nā hale ua o Ka'ōleio kū* (FS 133), the aforementioned houses of Ka'ōleio kū are deserted.
- 'uao, 'uwao.** nvt. To intercede, arbitrate, reconcile, mediate; referee, umpire, conciliator, arbitrator, peacemaker. *E 'uao ana nō lākou* (Heb. 7.25), to make intercession for them.
- ua ona o.** idiom. Aforementioned (often before names of people). *Ua hānau 'ia ua ona o Meipala i Kahiki*, the Mabel we've been talking of was born in Tahiti.
- ua.oa.** n. Light rain, mist. *Rare*.
- uapo, uwapo.** n. Wharf, pier, quay, dock, bridge. *Eng.* *Nā loa'a mai nā uapo mai*, revenues from wharves.
- ua pū.nohu.** n. A red rain in the sunshine.
- ua'u.** Var. spelling of *uwa'u* and same as *wa'u*, to grate.
- 'ua'u, 'uwa'u.** n. Dark-rumped petrel (*Pterodroma phaeopygia sandwichensis*), an endangered sea bird, considered by some an 'aumakua. See *kaini*.
- ua.ua.** 1. nvs. Tough, sinewy, glutinous, viscid, leathery; not easily broken, as cord. *Fig.*, hardheaded, willful, obstinate, tough-minded. *'Ā'Ŧ uaua*, stiff neck. (For a rare use of *uaua* as a noun, see *'Ilio-holo-i-ka-uaua*.) **ho'o.ua.ua.** To toughen; tough, stubborn. (PPN *uaua*.) 2. n. A variety of taro. The name may be qualified by the terms 'ele'ele, ke'oke'o, mōlina, piko. (HP 29, 30, 34.)
- 'uā.'uā.** Var. spelling of *'uwā'uwā*. Redup. of 'uā.
- u'a.u'a.** n. A tapa dyed as with 'ōlena (turmeric) or noni.
- 'u'a.'u'a.** Redup. of 'u'a.
- ua.uahi.** nvs. Smoky-gray color, as of tapa; gray quality, as of a whitened sugar-cane leaf; smoky, hazy; a reddish-blue tapa (Kam. 76:157).
- ua.ua.hoa.** Redup. of *uahoa*.
- ua.uai.** Redup. of *uai*.
- ua.ua.kaha.** nvs. Stiffness of the cords of the neck.
- 'ua.'uala, 'uwa'uwala.** nvi. Sour odor as of fermenting or decaying sweet potatoes; to smell thus.
- ua.'uali.** Var. spelling of *uwa'uwali*.
- ua.ua loli.** See *limu uaua loli*.
- 'Ua'u-kaha.** Same as *Ka-'ua'u-kaha*.
- 'ua'u kani.** n. Wedge-tailed shearwater or moaning bird (*Puffinus pacificus chlororhynchus*). *Lit.*, calling 'ua'u. Also *hō'io*.
- 'ua'u kē.wai.** n. A variety of 'ua'u. (Malo text, chapter 13, section 23.)
- 'Ua'u-komo-hewa.** Same as *Ka-'ua'u-komo-hewa*.
- 'Ua'u-lewa.lewa.** Same as *Ka-'ua'u-lewalewa*.
- uau.o'a, uauwo'a.** n. Distant sound, as of blended voices.
- ue, uwe.** 1. vt. To jerk, pull, twist, pry, turn, sway. Cf. *naue*. *Ka ue 'ana, 'o ka ue 'ana ia o ka mahi kalo i nā 'ohā ulu mua* (Kep. 157), the pulling away, this is a pulling away in the taro plantation of the first growing shoots. (PPN *ue*.) 2. nvi. A hula step: the caller announces the step to drummer (who changes the beat) and dancers by calling *e ue* (*e* imperative and *ue*). The right foot is extended forward with toes pointing, while both arms are brought forward to chest level with hands crossed and fingers tipped upward; the left hand stays up, while right arm and foot swing back in an outward arc. Then the right arm and foot are moved forward, and the step is repeated to the left. Then three short steps are taken forward. In the last step the left hand is forward, and the right foot and arm back. To
